# **Family Hubs Launch**

Families in County Durham will be able to access additional support services with the launch of new Family Hubs across the county.

Our official launch of our 15 Family Hubs was undertaken on 11th May 2023 by the Government's Early Years Health Adviser, Dame Andrea Leadsom, in Bishop Auckland. Two year old Vinnie, who attends Bishop Auckland's family hub kindly cut our opening ribbon.



The programme will see 75 areas benefiting from the £300 million investment up to 2025, with the new Hubs offering support from conception through to age 19, or up to 25 for children with special educational needs and disabilities.

One Point Family Centres are transforming into Family Hubs, providing additional services to families in one place from pregnancy through a child's early years until they reach adulthood.

This includes seeing midwives and health visitors, help with breastfeeding, support for dads, mental health support, parenting support, and help with budgeting, relationships and children's learning and development.

During the visit, Dame Leadsom met staff who will be working at the Hub as well as families and organisations who will utilise the services provided. Among these were Anne-Marie Marshall and her son Isaac who is eight months old. Anne-Marie said:

"There is something there for everyone and, as Isaac grows-up, I am confident we will get the support we need through all the different services on offer."

Dame Leadsom said:

"It was a huge honour to be invited to attend the launch of the County Durham Family Hubs programme in Bishop Auckland. Meeting the gorgeous babies and their parents was a highlight of the visit. So too was seeing the excellent work that was already underway at the hub."

Cllr Ted Henderson, our Cabinet member for children and young people's services, said:

"Over coming months, we will be transforming the help we offer through our network of Family Hubs across the county. "This is really helping us to transform our former family centres and being selected as a trailblazer authority has allowed us to quickly get more services and support for parents, carers and children across the county."

As part of the Family Hubs development we have established a Parent Carer Panel who are working with us to design services within the Family Hubs. The Parent Carer Panel is a group of parents and carers who want to be involved in designing services. Its a approach called Co-Production which recognises that if organisation want to deliver successful services, they must understand the needs of those using the service and work with them in the design and delivery.

With support from The Charlie Waller Trust, we worked with a group of parents and carer to develop the remit for the group, role descriptors and shared the opportunity to get involved in the work.

Over 60 parents expressed an interest in being part of the Parent Carer Panel and we now have a group of 20 parents and carer from across the County and from a range of backgrounds on our panel.

The Parent Carer Panel have been involved in working with managers from Health on how they design their new health drops ins, they have input into the new Family Hub registration form, and been part of the work around the Early Help Strategy in County Durham.







## Dads, Dads, Dads!

As a partnership we are making such exciting progress in relation to better engaging with Dads/Male Carers, so much so, Durham are being asked to speak at regional and national events about our shared journey!



Supported by County Durham's Family Hub and Start for Life programme, we are delighted to roll out the Durham Young Dads Project. This will provide a variety of direct support to young dads and dads-to-be in County Durham. Support is offered by experienced Young Fathers Support Workers and Peer Enablers with lived experience of being a young dad. ## Free Working with Dads and Male Carers Training

A Dad/Male Carers Project Group with trained 'Dads Champions' have been working hard to develop some Dad's Training aimed at all practitioners and managers working with children, young people and families. This is on-line and FREE!

The aim of the course is to provide front line staff and managers with the confidence, knowledge and skills to engage with and work effectively with Dads and male Carers.

By the end of the session attendees will:

- Understand what is meant by 'dads' or 'males carers' and why it is important that we engage with them
- Understand the experience of many dads and male carers in working with services
- Have considered the barriers to working with dads and male carers and the role of culture and attitudes in creating barriers
- Have an awareness of the benefits of engaging dads and male carers on children, dads and male carers and services
- Have knowledge of strategies and techniques which have been shown to be effective in recruitment and sustained engagement of dads and male carers
- Have considered how they can apply their learning.

## Help with your money

A dedicated web page <u>Help with your money</u> has been developed for County Durham residents and contains specific help for families. The page has information on a range of support available including applying for Healthy Start Vouchers, applying for Free School Meals (FSM), debt advice/financial help and help with heating and fuel bills.

The cost of school uniforms can be a struggle for families. Many schools now allow families to buy cheaper, unbranded uniform items,

or offer uniform swaps. There is a range of recycled uniform schemes being delivered through schools and voluntary and community sector partners.

A dedicated web page has been developed for families to find out about this support <u>Help with buying</u> <u>items for school - Durham County Council</u>

Families who are in receipt of child benefit and require help with buying items for school can also apply for a NE First Credit Union Family Loan. This can provide a parent with a loan of up to £500 without having a credit check. A Family Loan allows families to access a cash loan up front to purchase the required items as well as giving the option to save each month for the future.

## Review of County Durham's Partnership Approach to Early Help



County Durham's Partnership Review to Early Help (2019-2022) is currently being reviewed. A number of stakeholders including Durham's children, young people, parents and carers as well as partners from across the early help system are supporting with the co-design of Durham's reviewed 'approach'.

This will bring together our guiding principles of 'how' we can all, consistently deliver support to families regardless of our service or organisation.

### April 2024: National Supporting Families Programme (Stronger Families) to be governed by DFE

On 24 May 2023, it was announced that the government has agreed to transfer responsibility for the national Supporting Families Programme (known in Durham as Stronger Families) from the Department for Levelling Up, Housing and Communities (DLUHC) to the Department for Education (DfE) from April 2024. This was confirmed by the Prime Minister in a

#### Written Ministerial Statement

This move forms part of the government's ambitious set of reforms to drive improvement in the way we support families and protect children, as set out in the Implementation Strategy for children's social care reform, Stable Homes, Built on Love. The transfer of Supporting Families to DfE will enable the Education Secretary to deliver a coordinated, whole system of support for children and families, as well as ensuring services are sustainable for local government. The programme's model of stepping beyond single policy agendas to drive local integration and whole family support will be key for the reforms around Family Help.

Through services joining up and working better together, the programme has directly helped over 650,000 families with complex and multiple needs. Hundreds of thousands more have benefited from improved access to timely, coordinated support for the whole family. Importantly, the programme has shown what is possible when we step in early to help families and prevent problems from escalating.

DfE is committed to the full integration and successful delivery of the programme, one of the strengths of the programme is the relationships that have been established with areas and the joint development of the programme since 2012. Building a future system of effective, sustainable Family Help, with support and protection for children at its heart, will continue to require a committed,

strategic and collaborative approach.



## **Inclusion Practitioner Case Studies**

In Durham, there are 4 Secondary Behaviour Inclusion Panels (BIPs) which have been operating since September 2015. The panels consider referrals from Schools for pupils who are at risk of suspension.

In January 2020, the Special Educational Need and Inclusion Resource Board (SIRB) and Cabinet agreed to a proposal that future funding would focus on supporting Secondary BIPs to help further reduce the number of permanent exclusions and reduce pressures on the Pupil Referral Unit. BIP members in partnership with the LA developed the role of an Inclusion Practitioner whose role is to work with schools and families to explore and remove barriers to pupils accessing education.

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## **Early Help Assessment**

Between October 2022 and May 2023, 1046 Early Help Assessments requesting (additional) early help have been submitted through the new Children's Services Portal, **73% submitted by education partners**. Additionally, 265 Early Help Assessments are from partners telling us they are 'leading on' early help. Out of the 265, **65% are from schools**, 30% are from health and 5% from other partners. This number continues to rise which is really exciting as we are able to capture the fantastic support being provided to families across the system.

There is still opportunity for you to have your say and feed back on your experiences of the new Early Help Assessment process as we

look at ways in which to further improve and refine the process. So far we have had 88 responses however we want to extend the closing date for this particular survey to 31 July 2023. It is really important to the Prevention and Early Help Partnership that we hear from you. The survey takes between 2-5 minutes to complete, thank you in advance!

## Drop in or Drop out

#### School Engagement by Neighbourhood Policing Team

As with any educational facility children from different backgrounds will mix and unfortunately not always harmoniously. Reports of ASB, CRIME AND CONCERNING BAHAVIOUR will be reported to police.

Having developed a strong working relationship with the pastoral team at the school, PC Robert Simpson from the Framwellgate Neighbourhood Policing Team has created a monthly drop in session where PC Robert Simpson and his team can directly engage with students who have either shown concerning behaviours but have not crossed the line into crime or students who wish to engage with an Officer for career advice.

A trial has been ongoing for less than a year with several engagements having been successfully held, students have been open to engagement with no repeat concerns. As this is a comprehensive school, there is a mixture of children from a varied number of social backgrounds. The catchment area is vast, and this brings in children who previously went to separate schools. A meeting has been held with Durham Federation School, Ushaw Moor and drop-in sessions are due to commence.

The scheme has now been pitched to Durham Johnston and St Leonards School with potential start dates coming soon. All secondary schools covered by the Framwellgate Neighbourhood Policing Team are now engaged on this scheme.

Empowering Parents, Empowering Communities (EPEC) is a successful, low-cost

evidence-based parenting programme. EPEC groups are led by fully trained local parent group leaders

(PGLs). EPEC aims to improve child development and outcomes, parenting and family resilience.

We have been very lucky here in Durham to be able to offer this peer-led model to our families since September 2022; it has already had a huge impact and is continuously growing.

EPEC parenting programmes are different to our 'typical' parenting programmes, in which they are for Durham parents, delivered by Durham parents, which automatically removes the 'stigma' usually attached to parenting programmes.

We offer parents the chance to train as a PGL. This training is for one day a week (term time only) from 9.30am—2.30pm for 12 weeks. Once completed, PGLs can deliver the Being a Parent Programme (BAP) and will be internally certified by EPEC and externally accredited as a level 3 facilitator.

We cover childcare costs, mileage, refreshments etc. PGLS also have access to our varied career development programme.

We had four fantastic PGLS complete training in December 2022. They delivered three BAP groups. BAP is for parents/carers of children aged 2-11, it is for 9 weeks, 2 hours a week (term time only). We ran three groups across the County. We received some excellent feedback from the 14 parents who completed.

We also had a fantastic Durham Dad complete Train the Trainer training for EPEC and co-facilitated the Stanley BAP group and is currently cofacilitating the second round of PGL training in Stanley.

Our EPEC Co-Ordinator Laura-Jayne is now also trained in BAP Autism and the Baby and Us programme. Once parents have completed PGL training they can then receive top up training in these additional manuals.

Our future plans are to expand in order to keep up with the demands! Firstly, to grow our bank of PGLs, we will be putting on our next round of PGL training in September. We are also hoping to be trained in the Being a Parent-ADHD, which will be another peer led programme to add to our offer.

The PGLs we have currently will be delivering the BAP course termly; and we will hopefully roll out the additional EPEC courses in September across the County, covering East, South and North Durham. 'We learnt to empower ourselves, our children, our family, and our community'



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
